The May 17 meeting of the James River Art League is perhaps the most important of the year, when we elect officers who will lead the group for the next two years – including the period when the League observes its  $50^{th}$  anniversary.

A three-member nominating committee led by Gigi Vranian will present a slate of candidates for consideration at the annual business meeting. The slate was approved by the board at its meeting on May 3. Nominations may also be made from the floor.

The officer slate is: Mary Kent, president; Sally Booth, first vice president; Jane Cox, second vice president; Pat Trgina, secretary; Maryanne Evans, treasurer.

Mary Kent has worked on the membership committee, served two terms as newsletter editor, has been vice president and program chair. Like many others in the league, she developed a love of creating art early on; but career and life kept her too busy to devote much time to it. She started taking water color lessons after she retired, and eventually began participating in group shows. She joined JRAL in 2005.

Sally Booth has been a JRAL member since 1998 and has

# INVITED ALONG ON AN ARTIST'S PERSONAL JOURNEY

Do you sometimes feel like you see the world differently?

Mary Whyte's book, "An Artist's Way of Seeing," is a lyrical look into how she sees her subjects and the world around her.

As artists, we often focus on how we paint rather than our

motivation and what sets us apart from others. Mary Whyte takes us on a personal journey into what inspires her work, talking about the "why" of what she does instead of the "what" or "how."

This little book is filled with inspirational passages that touch on our emotions as artists, spur us to examine our own personal motivation, and urge us to move beyond techniques and tips.

As she advises us to "become masters at observing and feeling the world around us before we can begin to express it on an easel," she offers her own personal stories and observations about her subjects and the paintings they inspired.


She includes images of those paintings, studies and sketches and has organized the book by chapters titled by color, with engaging and lyrical stories of her life, travels and encounters as an artist. She also offers thought-provoking observations about painting and art, such as "every unsuccessful painting is a stepping stone to your very best", and "creating from the heart is the only way authenticity will happen."

She has a knack for capturing what artists feel but often can't express clearly. Writing about why we paint, she says "I think artists paint simply because it feels good, like sun on the back of the neck. Making art fills us with a surprising and unexpected happiness.... For artists, our work nourishes us and fills our senses. Every aspect of creating a painting is pleasurable; the feel of the brush in your hand, the smell of paint, the sound of a pencil moving across paper. Mixing

color on the palette is like watching butterflies come to life."

Something that unifies us as artists is our innate need to express to others what we see and feel; about this Mary writes, "Although we may be able to control and improve the quality of our work, the substance of what we ultimately express was embedded in our genes long ago. The sooner we come to realize and embrace this notion, the more original and engaging our creations will be."

In Mary's words, "Real art happens when we step out to the unknown, venture into new territory, and take a chance on where our senses will take us". This book engages our emotions as artists, and is a must read for artists who want to create from their heart.

held various positions, among them President, Vice President/Program Chair and Secretary. She holds a BFA from VCU. He had specialized in water media, but has moved into mixed media and is dabbling in oil.

Jane Cox has been in JRAL since 2007 and was president in 2009-11. She said she was a little concerned when asked to serve as president in that term, since she had not been in the group very long; but the board and the members made it easy and enjoyable. She has been recording secretary for the past two years. Originally an oil painter, she took on the challenges of watercolors about 12 years ago.

Pat Trgina's love of art began in her childhood in England. For many years she made porcelain dolls but later expanded her work into virtually all mediums and subjects. She joined JRAL about four years ago and enters many of our shows as well as displaying in many other venues around Richmond. She has a permanent wall display at Crossroads Art Center.

Maryanne Evans is standing for reelection as treasurer. She has initiated steps through the IRS to get JRAL certified as a non-profit organization and is looking toward completing the process. She has been in JRAL since 2008, after rekindling her interest in art. As a teen. she loved charcoal sketching, but now she finds "the beautiful clear colors of watercolor call to me."

Officers will serve two-year terms beginning on July 1, and are members of the JRAL Executive Board. The newlyelected president will appoint chairmen of the various standing committees who will also be on the Executive Board. The chairmen appoint members of their committees.

The standing committees are: Program, Membership, Exhibit, Gallery, Hospitality, Publicity, Communications, Newsletter, Archivist and Outreach. (The First Vice President chairs the Program Committee).
